Dear Governor,

As we take the time to reflect over what has been an unprecedented academic year having balanced the pandemic, kept children safe and provided them with a good education, I would like to thank each and everyone of



you for the support you have given the school/academy where you govern and the difference this makes to Barnsley children and our community. You give your time voluntarily and this is valued.

As you will be aware the Barnsley Schools' Alliance has been instrumental in guiding and supporting all leaders across the primary and secondary sector as we continue to drive successful outcomes for all our children and families. The strength of the Alliance has meant that partnership working has never been so crucial. For working collectively, we have the power to be able to achieve so much more.

Our focus must be welcoming and settling our children upon their return in September as we continue to implement our recovery plans whilst keeping settings, staff and children safe. Many schools and academies may find themselves within an Ofsted window. The Barnsley Alliance will support school leaders and governors to feel confident and well-prepared for their next inspection.

The potential impact of the pandemic on children's learning and well-being is well documented and, sadly, is likely to have far reaching consequences in the future. For those children from disadvantaged backgrounds, the impact is even more acute with initial analysis from organisations such as the Education Endowment Foundation (EEF) suggesting the attainment gap between disadvantaged pupils and their peers will widen as a result of Covid-19. With this in mind I ask governors to continue to focus your monitoring checks on the progress of these pupils, ensuring they are afforded every opportunity to succeed alongside their peers.

Attendance and exclusions will also be areas that remain high on the agenda as we strive to reduce pupils' absence as much as possible. If our children and young people are not in

school then they are not in a position to improve their outcomes and realise their aspirations.

Equally, following our recent sector led Peer Challenge for children with SEND in the borough, there is more to do in respect of early help and inclusion and supporting more children early, with SEN in mainstream provision.

I am pleased to report that following the recent retirements of Nick Bowen (Secondary Co-Chair of Barnsley Alliance) and Yvonne Gray (Primary Co-Chair) we are in a position to welcome the new Chairs of the Barnsley Schools' Alliance: Paul Crook (Headteacher Penistone Grammar) will become Secondary Co-Chair and Lee McClure (Springvale Primary) will fulfil the role of Primary Co-Chair. We also welcome Teresa Smith (Highview PLC) as Leadership Chair. Colleagues will take up their roles in September and will inevitably bring new ideas and approaches to shape the next phase of the Alliance's journey.

I would like to take this opportunity to offer my sincere thanks for your support. Working with the Barnsley Schools' Alliance and through high quality governor development programmes, we will continue to support you in your crucial role to deliver continuity of education and improve outcomes for all Barnsley children and young people.

Let's hope that this academic year brings about more consistency and less disruption for all our children, young people and the staff who support their education.

Dear Colleagues,

I hope you find the development opportunities detailed within this brochure helpful. Governor Services have worked hard this year to adapt sessions which have been delivered remotely through the use of Microsoft Teams, adapting to the challenges which the pandemic has brought about.



I thought it would be helpful to provide you with an insight into just some of the work the Barnsley School's Alliance has been undertaking in terms of the support available in addressing the gaps in children's learning. The Barnsley Schools' Alliance has committed financially to a comprehensive CPD support offer over the coming months. This is to ensure that the school workforce is well developed to support and aid our educational recovery. The sessions are intended for all Leaders, Middle leaders, Subject Leaders, teaching staff and support staff. The Alliance consulted colleagues from the sector and asked them to be part of a working CPD group to help shape and develop the programmes according to their needs. We hope that all colleagues will benefit and engage with this offer.

Further sub-groups have also been established creating a networking group which will ensure that colleagues feel well connected and better informed. Opportunities to share practice and be outward looking is the fundamental underpinning purpose of this group. A peer-review group is also being developed and I look forward to sharing the detail around this which will be shaped over the coming months.

You may or may not be aware that the Barnsley Alliance has also made a financial commitment to use the Launchpad for Literacy which complements the new EYFS framework and has the diagnostic capability to identify what children can do and their next steps. Launchpad provides EYFS teachers and practitioners with a framework in order for them to understand the small yet specific steps underpinning language development.

We hope that in investigating early we will in turn increase the percentage of children achieving GLD, expected levels in Communication and Literacy, Literacy and Maths. All Primary settings and PVI settings will benefit from this approach.

Writing is another area of focus for Barnsley. The Ofsted's briefing report (Oct 2020) noted that school leaders had spoken about the "need to work on pupils' writing, including their 'stamina' when writing at length'" to recover some of the opportunities children had missed to "practise their writing style and posture' during the first national lockdown. Practitioners will also have access to tailored CPD to support children.

To ensure governors feel supported there are various development sessions on offer throughout the Autumn Term such as: "How and When Schools will be inspected". This

session will ensure that governors understand the evaluation schedule, how schools will be judged and how the inspection framework will be applied in different contexts. Many schools will find themselves within the Ofsted window and we therefore encourage you to attend this session.

"Teaching a broad and balanced curriculum for education recovery" will also be of paramount importance. In June 2021 the DfE published its guidance 'Teaching a broad and balanced curriculum for education recovery'. This non-statutory guidance is for teachers and leaders in reception and key stages 1, 2 and 3 who are responsible for the curriculum and its teaching. It offers suggestions to help schools decide how to prioritise elements within their curriculum for education recovery. Through attending this session, you will be better informed and understand how the curriculum can improve the outcomes for the children in your setting.

Barnsley Governor Services will also continue to work closely with Barnsley Governors Association (BGA). Please watch out for the forthcoming governor forum sessions which are a great way to get networking and keep well informed.

May I also take this opportunity to thank you for the support you have given schools so far throughout these extraordinary times and ask that you continue to support your school going forward. In particular I ask that you remember to support each other, watching out for colleagues' mental health and well-being, as we grapple with re-establishing the school routine so that we enable our children to be the best they can be.

Please don't hesitate to contact me should you feel that there are any bespoke development sessions you would like us to perhaps deliver, tailored to your individual Governing Board.

Lauren Nixon, Children and Young People's Emotional Health and Wellbeing Lead

I am Lauren Nixon, the Children and Young People's Emotional Health and Wellbeing Lead, working within BMBC Public Health. My role is to provide strategic oversight and leadership across the emotional health and wellbeing system in Barnsley, this involves supporting the design, development and review of new and existing emotional health and wellbeing services, securing funding for new initiatives and supporting wider referral partners, such as GPs and Education settings to understand the service offer and how to



access the right service at the right time for our children and young people. From September 2021, we will be working to support Education settings in a number of ways, the Wellbeing for Education Recovery project will continue, and training will be delivered by CAMHS and our Educational Psychology Team. We have also developed a centralised emotional health and wellbeing training offer which includes training from both statutory and specialist services. I will be introducing a new Designated Mental Health Lead Network, which will provide an opportunity for your schools' designated lead to attend training, learn about service developments and updates, communicate directly with services such as CAMHS and the new COMPASS Mental Health Support Teams and be a place to share best practice and consult on planned initiatives and developments.

Clerking Services

The Department for Education (DfE) regards the role of the clerk as crucial to governing body effectiveness. The recent regulations require governing bodies to *"have regard to advice from the clerk in regards to exercising the governing board functions"*.

Barnsley Metropolitan Borough Council's Governors Service employs a number of suitably trained clerks who are available to schools who buy back the service, and who can offer expert advice and guidance to support the work of governors. All clerks are regularly briefed on new developments and current issues, and the quality of their work is rigorously monitored. The clerks are kept up-to-date with legislative and procedural requirements, and best practice, so that governing bodies can concentrate on their strategic role.

The clerk to governors has a central role in providing advice to the governing board on governance, constitutional and procedural matters to ensure that the governing board meets its statutory duties, to:

- Provide effective administrative support to the governing board and its committees.
- Ensure the governing board is properly constituted.
- Manage information effectively in accordance with legal requirements.

One key aspect of our service is that if our appointed clerk, or your regular clerk, is unable to attend a meeting, we will aim to provide a substitute.

As part of our service we also offer minute taking for confidential meetings, disciplinaries and SISG meetings should the need arise.

As a service we have maintained our support to schools throughout this challenging period of time by providing advice and guidance, and our Governing Body Clerks have continued to support virtual meetings.

The National Governance Association produced a report in September 2019 following a survey of school governors and trustees (contributed to by 5,923 individuals across England), and one of their recommendations for governing boards is to 'employ an independent and impartial clerk, where possible, for all meetings of the governing board rather than just the full governing board meetings.'

A recommendation for the government is that 'Clerking should be an essential part of government policy in terms of its approach to making school governance consistently more effective.'

Capacity to improve will be incorporated into the Overall Effectiveness. There will also be a judgement in the school's inspection framework and strong focus on behaviour and combating bullying. Complaints from parents may generate early inspection, but otherwise good and outstanding schools will not be inspected unless data indicates that there is slippage. A key message is that "Satisfactory is not good enough" with the suggestion that no improvement from satisfactory will be deemed insufficient progress.

Governor Development Opportunities

Interactive Governor Development sessions have been revised to reflect and respond to the current situation with Covid-19, to ensure that Governors are fully equipped with the information required to support the school in their role as Governor. We have also included some Webinars this time.

All sessions will continue to be held virtually via Microsoft Teams this Term and the cost remains at £55 per Governor per session, unless otherwise indicated. Some sessions will be subsidised by the Barnsley Schools' Alliance.

A list of Governor Development opportunities is available on page 16, followed by more information about each session.

Please note that development sessions will only run for a minimum of 5 participants in order for it to be viable.

A **cancellation fee** of £25 will be applied to the school if a Governor fails to attend a training session without notifying Governor Services two days prior to the training to allow sufficient time for the session to be cancelled if necessary.

Some of the sessions will require pre-learning tasks to be completed by Governors to enable the session to be more focussed on the areas of greatest need in terms of gaps in knowledge identified.

Virtual training sessions have been held very successfully, however if you are unfamiliar with using Microsoft Teams, a 'test' meeting prior to the actual training can be arranged so that you feel more comfortable, so please get in touch if this is something that you would benefit from. You will be sent an e-mail containing a link which you will need to click on to enable you to join the session on the day of delivery. You will be able to join the Microsoft Teams session at least 15 minutes prior to the start time to ensure that there are no technical issues. You will also be sent some instructions on how to join the session using a number of different devices, and some tips to be mindful of when using virtual platforms.

	Importance	 The Barnsley risk assessment framework for 2021 / 2022 has undergone significant revision since the Summer Term to align it with the new Ofsted criteria implemented from September 2021. Governors, particularly Chairs, are strongly encouraged to engage in the termly visit with their School Effectiveness Officer (SEO) to support their headteacher and other leaders with their school's risk assessment process, and to deepen their understanding of how this criteria is applied. Over the year these meetings will contribute to the cumulative Building A Picture document (2021-2022) that can provide governors with externally validated information about their school's performance, improvement priorities, and progress in addressing these. Governors will also notice that this document has also undergone significant revision for the current academic year. Therefore, it is highly recommended that each governing board is represented so that this essential information is shared and applied by each governing board.
	Aims & Objectives	 To know and understand the risk assessment framework and how the criteria align with the Ofsted framework that applies from September 2021 To be able to engage constructively with your School Effectiveness Officer during the Autumn Term visit in order to contribute to and receive external validation of your school's self-evaluation. To know and understand the 'non-negotiables' identified in the criteria that may limit your school's overall evaluation, and why these are important. To be able to use the Building a Picture (BAP) template to inform your school's plan of business for the 2021 / 2022 academic year. Boards in maintained schools have statutory duties. The board should ensure a robust appraisal policy is in place which minimises impact on workload. Appraisal should be a supportive, developmental process designed to ensure that all teachers and executive school leaders have the skills and support that they need to carry out their role effectively.

Importance:	In June 2021 the DfE published its guidance 'Teaching a broad and balanced curriculum for education recovery'. Taking the planned, sequenced curriculum as a starting point, it identifies the need to prioritise teaching missed content that will allow pupils to make sense of later work in the curriculum. This includes key knowledge, skills, vocabulary, concepts, and the links between concepts.

NEW	Being an effective link governor for English
	(phonics, reading and writing)
Importance:	All school leaders know and understand that reading should be prioritised to allow pupils to access the full curriculum offer. A rigorous and sequential approach to the reading curriculum develops pupils' fluency, confidence and enjoyment in reading.
